



UNIVERSITY OF GUELPH FEATURED IN HORTICULTURE BUILDING AT CNE



The University of Guelph was well represented by an attractive horticulture display at the CNE.

A large display featuring horticulture in modern living was planned and prepared by members of the School of Landscape Architecture and the Department of Horticulture. The committee in charge was convened by Dr. R. J. Hilton, at the request of Dean Richards.

The display featured three main areas. In one, horticultural research was featured, with the focal point being a hydroponic display showing nutritional studies on plants. The second area displayed some of the results of horticultural research, while the third area provided facilities for the staff to meet the public.

The staff on duty supplemented, by their conversations with members of the public, the two main objectives of the display. These were to interest students in horticulture as a profession, and to explain to the public something of the breadth of activities of horticulturalists.

An important objective of the display was to do a little "image building" for the University. Through use of modern, sophisticated design concepts, it was hoped to emphasize the evolution of the University. Too many urban people have been inclined to hold a rather rustic opinion of this campus, the planners felt, and they hope their display has helped to dispel it.

PRESIDENT WINS AWARD

Dr. W. C. Winegard has been awarded the 1967 Alcan Award for his "highly significant contribution to the field of metallurgy." He was presented with the award at the annual conference of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy in Kingston last week.

In presenting the award on behalf of the Institute, Dr. W. G. Young, Director of Research for the Aluminum Company of Canada, said, "The award, which was established in 1966, honors a Canadian member of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy who has made an outstanding contribution to the advancement of metallurgy in Canada particularly in the academic field."

REGISTRATION TO JUMP BY 900 FOR FALL SEMESTER

Nine hundred more students will enrol for the fall semester than registered a year ago, predicts Assistant Registrar, Bob Renwick. Registration day for first semester students is Monday, September 11 and for all other semesters - Tuesday, September 12.

Total enrolment is predicted to reach 4,307 - up 26% over a year ago. Freshman enrolment at 1,500 will be up 18% over a year ago.

Total enrolment is up some 2,000 over 1965 - the year Arts and Science students were first accepted. The predicted enrolment of 4,307 made up of 3,880 undergraduates and 427 graduate students, is in line with long term predictions which forecast that we will have 6,000 by 1970.

Predictions of first semester enrolment by degree programs with last year's figures in brackets are listed: B.A. - 540 (317), B.Sc. - 280 (222), B.S.A. - 215 (250), B.Sc. (Eng.) - 42 (42), B.Sc. (P.E.) - 40 (34), B.L.A. - 13 (12), B. H.Sc. - 100 (100), D.V.M. - 80 (64), Diploma - 212 (212).

"THE CANADIAN NURSE" CONTAINS ARTICLE ON U. OF G. SEALS

The monthly journal, The Canadian Nurse, published for the nurses of Canada, contains an article entitled "Seals for Patients". The authors are Elizabeth Johnson, R.N.A., Elizabeth deJong, R.N. and Marilyn Foster, R.N., research technicians in the Department of Zoology.

The seals are amiable harp seal pups who were born about March 1, 1967 in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

The writers say the care of the seals is a pleasurable task as they are characters with their very individual personalities. They receive T.L.C. (tender, loving care) from the girls, and enjoy a daily diet of nine or ten sea herring as well as a vitamin pill.

Blood is drawn from the hind flipper of each seal every two weeks for research. Electrocardiogram tracings are also taken. Other records include weight, heart rate and measurement of length.

The program is directed by Professor Keith Ronald, Head, Department of Zoology.

CENTENNIAL YEAR - A TIME TO REMEMBER THE PAST

Continuing a history of the OAC, as written for the Semi-Centennial of the OAC, we visit the years 1920-1924.

"The "after the war reconstruction period", long-heralded, then arrived with the new complexities and problems. These events are too recent to properly be regarded as "history". Two phases of the record may, however, be noted. Mills Hall and the Apiculture building, started in previous years, were completed and opened with due ceremony. A very handsome and well equipped Dairy Building, long needed, was added. A popular fund was opened to raise funds for a Memorial Hall to commemorate the part of the OAC in the war. This was well supported and with generous assistance from the Government this fine structure is now nearing completion, and will be opened as part of the semi-centennial celebration. There remain two or three departments which require new modern accomodation, and then the "re-making" of the College will be complete. Important changes were also brought about on the academic side. The course was remodelled. Instead of the Associate Course being the same as the first two years of the Degree Course, a separate course was arranged and matriculation was adopted as the admission requirement for the Degree Course.

"Thus, over the winding path of fifty years, the College has come to its present position and stature."

This concludes the continuing history of the OAC, as written for the semi-centennial in June, 1924. Beginning next week we will present the history of Macdonald Institute as written for its fiftieth anniversary in 1953.

NATIONAL RESEARCH COUNCIL ANNOUNCEMENTS

DR. Y. BACHMAT has joined the Department of Soil Science as a Professional Associate to work with Dr. D.E. Elrick on molecular diffusion in soil-water systems and to participate in the graduate training program.

Dr. Bachmat is a graduate of the Technion Israel Institute of Technology in Haifa from which he received his B.Sc. in 1958, M.Sc. in 1962 and D.Sc. in 1966. Since 1958 he has been in the department of hydrology of the Tahal Company (Water Planning for Israel) Ltd., Tel Aviv conducting research on groundwater problems. Dr. Bachmat is an author and co-author of several scientific papers on flow through porous media.

Dr. Bachmat is accompanied by his wife and two children.

DR. C. P. MAMARIL recently joined the Department of Soil Science as an N.R.C. Postdoctoral Fellow to work with Dr. M. H. Miller on the influence of ammonium on phosphorus absorption by plants.

Dr. Mamaril is on leave from the University of the Philippines where he has been an Assistant Professor of Soils conducting research on nitrogen fertilization of rice and corn as well as teaching. Dr. Mamaril received his M.S. from the University of Wisconsin and his Ph.D. from Kansas State University.

Dr. Mamaril is married and has two boys, aged 7 and 3. His wife and children are in Columbia, Missouri where she is studying for a Ph.D. in agricultural chemistry.


WORLD GUERNSEY BREEDERS VISIT CAMPUS

The campus played host to Guernsey breeders from around the globe last week. At the conclusion of a three day World Guernsey Conference, 50 of the delegates spent three more days touring Ontario, and spent some time at the Breeders Service Building.

In addition to touring the semen freezing and storage facilities, the group heard a discussion by Dr. E.B. Burnside Department of Animal Science on that Department's studies for genetic improvement through selective breeding programs.

Following the discussions, Dean N. R. Richards was host to the group at lunch. The party included delegates from Australia, South Africa, England, Guernsey Island, United States and Canada. In all some 300 delegates took part in the preceding Conference, General Chairman of which was Harold Clapp, Dairy Extension Specialist, Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food, who is located in the Department of Animal Science, and currently President of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Association.

This was the first world wide meeting of Guernsey breeders, and plans were made for continuation of such meetings on a regular basis.

PROFESSOR CLARENCE J. MUNFORD, Department of History, this week received notification that the Canada Council has granted him the sum of \$3,250.00 to assist him financially in his research on the social background of the French Revolution in the Comté de Nevers.
