

### WORLD LITERACY OF CANADA ORGANIZATION TO MEET AT U. OF G.

The 10th Annual Conference of the World Literacy of Canada will be held at the University of Guelph on Saturday, September 23. A program of discussion, films, panels and reports has been planned.

A veteran World Educationalist, Dr. Welthy H. Fisher will present the keynote talk on Literacy Village and the Young Farmers Institute which she founded. Dr. Fisher has been a dynamic worker in India and the Far East.

Jon S. Church, a 1963 graduate of the OAC and his wife, Mary Lou, a 1963 graduate of Macdonald Institute, will be panelists. Mr. Church spent one year with CUSO teaching Indian farmers on a Poultry Project under UNICEF ASSIGNMENT. Both Mr. and Mrs. Church spent a year in Ghana, teaching science, agricultural economics and home economics.

Bruce Kidd, Canadian athlete, recently returned from an assignment in India in the educational field, and now engaged in the Community Program Division of the Ontario Department of Education, will also be a panelist.

The World Literacy of Canada has published a booklet to inform Canadians in all walks of life about a basic problem in the world today--the massive illiteracy, with resulting hunger, poverty and disease, which marks the lives of so many people in the developing countries.

Literacy Village in Lucknow, India, was founded by Dr. Fisher following a statement by Mahatma Ghandi shortly before his death. He said, "If you would do something for India, help the people in our villages. Teach them to read." Research in adult education techniques is carried on in the Village

and teachers are trained to go into the villages to teach reading, writing, arithmetic, nutrition, hygiene, family care and planning, and farming.

There is a small registration fee which includes luncheon, but anyone wishing to sit in on the discussions may do so free of charge. Everyone is welcome.

Dr. Bayley presented a paper entitled "The influence of team pelleting on the physical and nutritional properties of corn and soybean meal". WILLIAM S. STEELE, a staff member of the School of Physical Education, who is and internationally recognized Ornithologist, presented a paper when attending the 85th Annual Convention of the American Ornithologists, which was held at the Royal Ontario Museum (University of Toronto).

DR. G. W. FRIARS, DR. J. D. SUMMERS, DR. E. T. MORAN, PROF. B. S. REINHART, MR. T. K. MUKHERJEE, MR. R. SHANTZ, MR. S. P. LALL, and MR. S. CHATTERJEE of the Department of Poultry Science attended the 56th annual meeting of the Poultry Science Association at the University of New Hampshire, Durham, N.H., U.S.A. Dr. Summers, Dr. Moran, Prof. Reinhart, Mr. Mukherjee, Mr. Shantz and Mr. Chatterjee each presented a paper. Dean H. D. Branion of Graduate Studies has been appointed again as editor of "Poultry Science".

DR. A. J. MUSGRAVE, Department of Zoology, attended one day of the international meeting of the Biological Photographers Association in the Royal York Hotel, Toronto. Photomicrography and our closed circuit T.V. were among the subjects discussed.

DR. M. I. DYER and MR. F. W. ANDERKA, Department of Zoology, presented a joint paper entitled "Field Telemetry Studies in Avian Ecology", to the annual meeting of the American Ornithologists Union held this year at the Royal Ontario Museum, Toronto. The meetings were also attended by Dr. E.D. Bailey, Dr. A.L.A. Middleton, and Messrs. J. Collins, J. Hintz, G. Parker, and J. Ward, all of the Department of Zoology.

BRUCE LIBERTY, Associate Professor of Geology, Department of Soil Science, has returned from the Geological Association of Canada-Mineralogical Association of Canada's three-day International Convention of geologists in Kingston. In addition to organizing the Stratigraphy-Palaeontology-Sedimentology sessions, he read a paper on the Ottawa Valley, published a paper of the geology of the Kingston area in the convention guidebook, and led a one-day study group on the Cambrian and Ordovician rocks of the Kingston area.

DR. H. MACCRIMMON, Department of Zoology, was one of the thirty scientists and writers from Canada, U. S. A., and Mexico invited to participate in a "Workshop on Teaching of Scientific Writing". The 5-day workshop was sponsored by the Sloane Foundation and held at Rockefeller University and Harriman Campus of Columbia University.

DR. JOHN T. POWELL, PROFESSORS PEEPRE, WALKER, COOPER, CHARTERIS and STALLMAN of the School of Physical Education were actively involved in the 11-day 6th National Track and Field Coaches' Clinic held at the University of Guelph.

DR. A. N. MYHR, Department of Dairy Science, recently attended the 54th annual meeting of the International Association of Milk, Food and Environmental Sanitarians held in Miami Beach, Florida. Dr. Myhr was chairman of the 1967 Program Committee and was installed as the new President of the Association at the meetings in Florida. Some of the main objectives of this Association are: to improve the professional status of the Sanitarian; to develop uniform and proper methods for inspection of dairy farms, dairy and food processing plants as well as food-handling establishments including restaurants, warehouses and transport systems; to encourage and promote improvements in the sanitary design of food processing equipment and to assist in the development of programs for the control of water and air pollution in efforts to maintain a safe and healthful environment for the betterment of mankind.

Padre Bill Young was honored during a reception held in Community House and attended by his colleagues at the University. A silver tray with the inscription "TO PADRE BILL YOUNG PRESENTED BY HIS FRIENDS SEPTEMBER 7, 1967" was given to Padre Young.

Dr. B. C. Matthews, Vice-President Academic, chairman for the afternoon said, in part, "The character or image of a University is made up of many components. One might say that one of these components is the University crest and the letterhead; another of these components is the physical plant, the buildings, the architecture, the design of the campus, but one of the most important, if not the most important component that determines the character of a University, is the people who comprise the University, the students, the alumni and the faculty.

"One of those who has made a real contribution toward the image of the University is the man whom we are honouring here this afternoon. In his work at the University and particularly in the Colleges before the establishment of the University, Padre Young has influenced for the better the lives of many people.

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

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FOUNDER'S BUST FOR O.V.C.

Dr. W. G. Ballard of Vancouver, a graduate of the O.V.C. in 1912, has commissioned Miss Frances Gage of Toronto to model a head of Dr. Andrew Smith, who founded the College in 1862 and operated it as a private school until 1908 when the Ontario Government took it over. The academic program came under the jurisdiction of the University of Toronto. This arrangement continued until 1964 when O.V.C. became a founding college of the new University of Guelph.

Dr. Ballard is presenting the Founder's bust to his alma mater and the College is honoured to receive this gift from one of its distinguished graduates.

"It is not only among the faculty, students and alumni, that the Padre is well and favourably known. For many years he carried the name of the Colleges into almost every city and town in Ontario. He spoke to many groups in many places and never failed to give a good account of himself and of the Colleges which he represented. I am sure that many of you who have had occasion to attend meetings of the various groups particularly in rural Ontario have had the experience that I have had on several occasions. One of the first questions that I have often been asked by people in many parts of the province has been, "and how is Padre Young these days".

"Although he has decided to retire from the University on October 1, I am sure we are all pleased we will continue to have some contact with him in the years to come. He has accepted the position as editor of the Alumni News which will keep him in touch, at least on paper, if not in person, with all of the alumni and the faculty. He has also accepted the position as secretary to the Swine Breeders Association which will allow him to continue and even extend his contacts with the people in rural Ontario.

"On behalf of those who have gathered here this afternoon, and many others who are not here, I wish to present you with a small gift which is meant to remind you of us, and you can be assured that we will not forget you."

Padre Young, in expressing his thanks, said he was looking forward to his retirement but happy to keep his connection with the alumni and faculty through his new duties with the Alumni News.

MR. L. F. MACRAE, Chief Librarian of the University left Sept. 8 for Tokyo to attend the 33rd Conference of the Federation International de Documentation (FID). He will be attending the Conference in his capacity as Chairman of the National Research Council's Associate Committee on Scientific Information. Mr. MacRae plans to take with him samples of the first computer-printed indexes of Government Documents produced by the University of Guelph Library's Documentation Center and deliver a paper describing the unique Guelph system which, in contrast to other mechanized storage and retrieval systems, allows the documents to be stored so as to allow the user to "browse" through the reports produced by any agency. This feature Mr. MacRae considers to be a very valuable one for a collection of documents intended for academic use.

MRS. SHIRLEY PETERSON, School of Physical Education, attended a 9-day Hockey Course for coaches at Brandon, Manitoba. Mrs. Peterson was the only woman coach of the 80 who attended.

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VISITORS ON CAMPUS

Dr. J. G.
