



## Italy and the Italians is published

Ah, to be Italian. Most of us envy the Italian zest for life, but alas, must be content to experience it vicariously. "On Italy and the Italians" a collection of essays edited by Professor Gianni Bartocci, gives a glimpse of Italian achievements in the arts and the Italian way of life. "The supreme discovery of the Italians is the art of living," writes Professor Bartocci.

"On Italy and the Italians" was originally a popular lecture series presented on campus in 1972 through the Office of Continuing Education. It covered Italians in Canada, Dante, the Italian Renaissance and a description of the Italian people. In addition to

Professor Bartocci, lecturers included Professors Margaret Evans, Alan Wilshere and Jules Wright.

Professor Bartocci, who coordinated the lecture series, felt that there was a lack of published information in this area and actively sought funding to publish the series of lectures in book form. The Carling Community Arts Foundation provided a \$500 grant to publish the volume which appeared this month.

## FACULTY ACTIVITIES

Professor J.B. Stone, Animal and Poultry Science, spoke at the Halton County Holstein Breeders' Association barn meeting in Milton on keeping feed costs down.

Professor A.G. Meiering presented a paper entitled "Concrete can be oxygen limited too" to the National Silo Association Conference.

Professor K.C. Tan, Geography, and five students in the Asian Studies Program recently attended a Canadian Council on Southeast Asian Studies Conference on strategies for social change in Malaysia and Singapore held at Brock University, St. Catharines. Professor Tan delivered a discussion paper on public housing and urban development as a strategy for economic growth in Singapore. He also chaired the session which dealt with international law of the sea, Malacca Straits and offshore oil, and served as a member of the organizing committee.

Professor R.R. Hacker, Animal and Poultry Science, spoke at the recent swine conference held at the University of Guelph on stress and pork production.

Professor L.J. Martin and A.G. Zwart, Ag. Ec. & Ext. Ed., attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Pork Council in Toronto. Professor Martin also delivered a paper on some aspects of the federal hog stabilization program at the annual meeting of the Ontario Pork Producers Marketing Board.

His subject was curriculum and materials in adult education: the international scene. ## Selvarajahs revisit Guelph for Christmas season

Carol and Selva Selvarajah have come back to Guelph from Malaysia, hopefully for a white Christmas. They spent about three years here when Selva was working on his Ph.D. in poultry science. Now director of the Planning and Evaluation Division of Malaysia's National Livestock Development Authority, Dr. Selvarajah is combining business with pleasure on this holiday. He has met with his former Ph.D. chairman and co-chairman, Fred Jerome and John Summers and his other supervisors, and has also travelled to Ottawa to meet his government counterparts there. The Selvarajahs are staying with Jim and Anne Shute. Professor Shute visited them last spring enroute from China to Ghana.

Dr. Selvarajah originally came to Guelph to study the genetics and nutrition of dwarf chickens for increased egg production. He was at that time director of the Institute for Poultry Development in Malaysia, a position he held until last year when he was seconded to the livestock authority. When Dr. Selvarajah returned to Malaysia in 1970, he took some White Leghorn chicks carrying the recessive dwarf gene. Work on the nutrient requirements of this same stock is being carried on by Khoo Teck Hong who did a master's degree here with John Summers.

In his new position with the National Livestock Authority, Dr. Selvarajah is concerned with livestock and abattoir development, as well as organizing marketing and credit facilities for livestock farmers. A successful enterprise has been the introduction of the AMZ cattle (Australian Milking Zebu) — a cross derived from the Indian Sahiwal cattle and the Jersey in Australia. Crosses between Brahms and Herefords, used extensively in Queensland,

are also showing promise in Malaysia, where grazing land is being developed from jungle. Seed for pastures also comes from Queensland. So far, 12,000 new acres of pasture have been planted. By 1980 there should be 36,000 acres in pasture land. Already over 10,000 head of breeding cattle are grazing in seven different locations.

Dr. Selvarajah does not expect beef to become the major source of protein in his country and feels it is very unlikely that beef will ever overtake fish or poultry. At present work is being done to develop beef cattle feed lots, using oil palm and pineapple wastes as

feed. It may even be possible, he said, to separate the metal and glass from city garbage and recycle the residue for cattle feed. This is already being done in some parts of the world.

When the Selvarajahs lived in Guelph they made many friends, both through the University and in the town. Selva was the first graduate student senator on the University of Guelph Senate, and Carol taught Asian cooking to enthusiastic classes at the Y. The Selvarajahs plan to spend the next two weeks with the Shutes before returning to Malaysia via the West Indies, South America and Tahiti.




## 50 gifts to art [10]

The University of Guelph's permanent art collection now numbers close to 550 items. The collection, which has grown by 50 this year, includes Canadian paintings, drawings, prints and sculpture dating from 1800 to the present as well as international graphics. Selections are regularly exhibited in the gallery space on the main floor of the library. Many works are hung in campus buildings.

One of the most recent additions is faculty member Walter Bachinski's cement fondu relief, *Running Mother and Child*, purchased through alumni contributions to the Alma Mater Fund. It will be shown in the Fine Art Faculty exhibition in January before a permanent location is chosen. An ink drawing by Georges De Niverville and two works from the 1930's by Eric Bergman and Ernst Neumann were also acquired through the Alma Mater Fund. Macdonald Institute and Family & Consumer Studies Alumni Association gave a canvas by Saskatchewan artist Dorothy Knowles to mark the OAC Centennial. It hangs fittingly in the Arboretum Centre, built by funds from alumni and OMAF. Gifts from individual alumni include a Carl Schaefer water color *Windy Sky over the Fields, Hanover* (1938) given by Florence Partridge, and a bronze sculpture of Susannah Chase Steckle, the first woman agricultural graduate of OAC, by Japanese artist Wakahiko Yamamoto, donated by the Steckle family. Both of these contributions were in honor of the centennial. Other alumni gifts include *The Spider Series*, a set of four lithographs by fine art faculty member Gene Chu and a serigraph by Robert Young, given by F.N. Jerome, OAC '33.

Two new water colors, one by Jack Humphrey and the other by William Henry Edward Napier, were acquired through donations made by alumni and friends of OVC. These pictures join the growing group of

# Collection this year

Canadian art works at OVC hung in Rooms 201 and 209 of the main building.

Fine art printmaking students purchased 26 new prints for the printmaking workshop study collection, kept in the basement of Zavitz Hall where it is available for teaching and individual study. Selections from the collection are on exhibition on the main floor of the library until January 5.

The City of Guelph presented a Ken Danby water color, *Pulley Wheel*, to the university to commemorate the centennial. Currently on loan to the Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery for their Danby exhibition, this painting is usually hung in the Arboretum Centre.

The collection is currently being catalogued by the curator of art, Judith Nasby, and her assistant, Julia Wallace, under a grant from the National Museums Corporation. The catalogue will be published on micro-fiche by the corporation as part of the national inventory of Canadian museum holdings.


The university's committee on art acquisitions, chaired by Professor M.H.M. MacKinnon, advises on the suitability of all purchases and



He is assisting in the veterinary parasitology course and seminars and is conducting research on parasites and their effect on food fishes from various lakes in Ontario.

Dr. Francis Tapon has joined the Department of Economics as assistant professor. He received his Licence, D.E.S. (Economics) from the University of Paris, Paris, France in 1967 and his M.B.A. degree from Columbia University, New York in 1969. Under a Duke University Graduate Fellowship he obtained his M.A. degree from Duke University, Durham North Carolina in 1973 and his Ph.D. degree from the same university in 1974.

## Microbiologist visits Europe

Dr. Ron Sonstegard, research scholar of the Canadian Cancer Institute who is presently working in the Department of Microbiology, College of Biological Science, recently attended several international cancer meetings in Europe. Dr. Sonstegard presented an invited paper entitled Studies of the etiology and epizootiology of lymphosarcoma in *Esox* (*Esox masquinongy* and *Esox lucius*) in North America at a symposium on aquatic animals as indicators of environmental carcinogens sponsored by the International Union Against Cancer and held in Ireland. He also chaired a session on viral oncology at the symposium and later participated in a meeting of the Committee on Comparative Oncology of the International Union Against Cancer, discussing new and ongoing approaches to environmental carcinogenesis and utilization of animal models for exploring the etiology and epidemiology of cancer in man. He also attended the Eleventh International Cancer Congress held in Florence, Italy, and gave a paper entitled Neoplasia incidence studies of fish inhabiting polluted and non-polluted waters in the Great Lakes of North America. In these investigations, over 26,000 fish were captured and autopsied with particular reference to tumors. The Cancer Congress, which meets every four years, brings together on a world basis cancer researchers of all disciplines.

## Honduras reconstruction fund

The Guelph appeal made by the World University Service of Canada for funds to assist a reconstruction project in Honduras raised a total of \$556.98 from the university campus and Chalmers United Church. The fund-raising on campus was organized by Heather Fuller, program director of International House, and she wishes to thank all the students who donated their time to assist with the sound-slide show.

## Move completed

By the end of this month all the administrative offices will have moved into the University Centre. The last moves will be by the president's office, including the vice presidents and administrative assistants, Personnel and Employment Department, Accounts Payable, Payroll, Internal Auditor, Physical Resources, Comptroller, General and Trust Accounting. These offices will be relocated from the library to the fourth and fifth levels of the University Centre, south side. The faculty Club and the Whippletree Restaurant will open in the new building on January 6.

## Metals in the biosphere

A symposium on metals in the biosphere to be held on January 7 will cover the geochemistry of weathering, metal transfer in the environment, metals in water, soil and plants and in soil microbiology. The symposium, sponsored by the Department of Land Resource Science and OAC, will be held in Physical Science 113, and will continue in the same location on January 8 and the morning of January 9 under the sponsorship of the Ontario Soil Management Committee. Registration for the first day is \$8 through the Office of Continuing Education. Second and third day are free. In the program for January 8 and 9, metals will be discussed in a more local context than on the first day, with a talk on the effects of metals on animal health.
